

To reduce youth gang involvement and crime through a holistic approach.










Policy Solutions

Problem

Disadvantaged neighborhoods have no say in shaping the policy that directly affects them.

76% of those under 24 are rearrested within 3 years of release from incarceration.



1 in every 8 New Yorkers between the ages of 18 and 24 are out of school and out of work.

Solution

JAYC is a paid twelve week community change and civic education leadership program for system impacted youth ages 18 to 25 year olds to study social justice and to work with formerly incarcerated adults, New York City officials, and Columbia University students to co-develop policy solutions.







Next Steps

Launching our **fifth cohort** in **September** 2022.

Hosting the program at **Rikers Island Correctional Facility** to serve young adult prison population aged between 18 and 21.

Preparing to launch **Project Restore Bed-Stuy** and the Department of Education High School **Social Justice Seminar.**

Monitoring and evaluation to determine scaling potential of the program across New York City and beyond.

- Develop a guide and toolkit for program implementation
- Develop Facilitator Training Academy
- Establish Alumni Community
- Support Policy Proposal Implementation

- Engagement in Community Projects


